n late July, Sylte Shipyard (Maple Ridge) launched the A.G. McIlwain-designed tug TYMAC TIDE for Tymac Launch Service (Vancouver). The 35'9" x 16' x 7'8" (max draft) steel hull is topped by an aluminum wheelhouse with a main control station inside, two control stations up top (one facing forward, one aft) plus another on the back of the house for use on deck – all equipped with Kobelt controls. Propulsion is twin 375 hp (@ 1800 rpm) John Deere AFM75 diesels turning Osborne propellers in 43-in nozzles through ZF W325 gears. The TYMAC TIDE is the first vessel designed and purposebuilt vessel for the company. Mike Phillipson, Tymac's de facto historian, notes that the only other vessel acquired new by the company was the TYMAC No.5 which was purchased as-built from Matsumoto Shipyard, the rest of the fleet was acquired from prior owners. The TYMAC TIDE will see service primarily in Vancouver Harbour moving bunkering and lightering barges alongside ships and other duties for the company's fleet. 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Robust dogs, or log teeth, will give a good bite on a boomstick or a fender log to hold position. External box coolers are visible along the bilges.



The launch was carried out by All-Tow Boat Moving (Delta) with a large truck from Mundie's Towing (Burnaby, see inset) paying out wire cable under tension to act as a secondary braking force while the primary truck and trailer were on the launch ramp. Twin John Deeres power the two Osborne propellers



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shown in this photo, which are housed in 43-in nozzles with

twin rudders on each.



(left) — forward access to the engine room is via a hatch inside the wheelhouse. Up top is a Survitec life raft and twin spotlights as well as two more control stations. There are four control stations on the TYMAC TIDE, including the main one in the wheelhouse, each equipped with Kobelt steering and engine controls.

TYMAC TIDE floats light on her lines with fuel, water, tow-wire and supplies still to come on board. As Western Mariner went to press, sea trials were getting underway. We'll have more on this tug in a future issue when she is in service.
